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February Editorial—*Why Valentine's Day?*



What does Valentine's Day mean to you?

Is it a special day to celebrate with the one you love? Does it mean chocolate covered marshmallow candy, heart-shaped cookies, and/or making Valentine's Day cards from scratch?

But did you ever wonder about the history behind Valentine's Day? As usual, my curiosity got the best of me, so here are my cliff notes compiled from several articles.

Where did Valentine's Day Originate?

As with much of history, Valentine's Day has its origins as an ancient Roman agriculture and human fertility festival. It was held in mid-February, and was called the feast of Lupercalia honoring Lupa, the wolf who was said to have suckled Romulus and Remus (purported founders of Rome in 753 B.C.). This festival was also dedicated to Faunus, the Roman god of agriculture, and was the season to start sowing seeds and to pray for a fertile year of crops.

How did it become St. Valentine's Day?

As legend goes, Roman Emperor Claudius II prohibited soldiers from marriage. However, a priest named Valentine defied these orders and secretly married young couples to spare their husbands from war. Valentine was then caught, imprisoned, tortured, and beheaded.

Yet in another legend, Valentine supposedly signed a letter "from your Valentine" to his jailer's daughter, whom he had befriended and healed from blindness.

Finally, in 496 A.D. Pope Gelasius marked February 14 as the day to honor Valentine's martyrdom and so the celebration of St. Valentine's Day began.

On the lighter side...

The more romantic nature of Valentine's Day was celebrated in the Middle Ages, when it was believed that birds paired as couples in mid-February. Also, Chaucer and Shakespeare romanticized this day of love in their works, and thus it gained popularity throughout Britain and the rest of Europe. In addition, handmade paper cards began to be exchanged.

It's fun to make Valentine's Day cards to send anonymously to a neighbor, good friend, or family member! Just gather up some vintage postcards, colorful paper, feathers, ribbons, or whatever you have on hand. Write a big "?" on the inside and see if your recipient guesses their "secret admirer."

Whatever you do on St. Valentine's Day, enjoy the day!

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

February Weed Control

Weeding is a big part of a homeowner's landscape maintenance. Being proactive before they have the chance to take over can be the best way to go about your landscaping efforts this year. Done carefully, it's good exercise with a bit of sunshine. Google the health benefits of gardening. They're amazing!

Millennium Memo

“I find this rent increase is horrible! Let’s get real and re-calculate! Use the 3% you did last year!” Comments from a Palomar East letter-writer.

That’s a variation on a letter we get every year at this time, probably from the same person. As the letter stated, last year we did, in fact, adjust rents by 3% (less than half of the 6.5% inflation rate), but that was also too high for some folks.

What do you think? Are we being unfair? Before you answer, consider the following. On the date we sent out the notice, the San Diego County cost of living index had increased by 8.2%, quite a bit more than this year’s increase of “only” 6%.

I’d also point out that the average rent in East is \$113/month less than West and \$96 less than Rancho Vallecitos. Rents at those parks will go up more than yours did.

We aren’t just sitting on your rent money. Over the past two years, we’ve spent \$500K on capital improvements to Palomar East, versus about \$400K in net surpluses. That’s right: we invested \$100K more on improvements than the Park generated.

So, given that Palomar East’s rents are the lowest in San Marcos for a Park of its quality, our increases have always been less than inflation and have been moderate for several years and the fact that we reinvest every dollar of Surplus back into the Park...aren’t you getting a fair deal?

In Happier News

- 55 residents from our three San Marcos Parks enjoyed another Band & Bingo event at Palomar East. Attendees were treated to a FREE lunch, live music and five bingo games. Among the prizes were a \$50 rent credit. Sounds fun, doesn’t it?







Recipes from the Heart

Many attendees at the December Holiday Dinner, requested the recipe for a particular salad that was brought by Sally Yeater. Lucky for them, Sally has provided a photo and the recipe.



Cold Vegetable Medley

Vegetable Ingredients

- 1 Can corn (drained)
- 1 Can French cut green beans (drained)
- 1 Can small peas (drained)
- 1 Small jar chopped pimentos (drained)
- 1 Cup chopped celery
- 1 Cup chopped onion
- 1 Cup chopped red or green bell pepper

Marinade Ingredients

- 1/3 Cup oil
- 2/3 Cup white vinegar
- 3/4 Cup sugar
- 1 TB water
- 3/4 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp pepper

Directions

1. Mix vegetables together.
2. Pour marinade over mix.
3. Marinate for several hours or overnight.

Note: Salad will keep for several weeks in a sealed container in the refrigerator.



Variations: A common variation of this salad uses frozen instead of canned veggies, plus garbanzo beans, cauliflower florets, chopped red onion, cold pressed olive oil, red wine vinegar, and a hint of fresh garlic.

Also, some prefer small green onions chopped fine as they have a milder flavor. Try adding a few garden herbs as well for a more intense flavor experience.
