

July 4th Speeches of the Past

As the July 4th celebrations approach, I read many articles considering how to highlight 'the best of America,' what is right about America. There are certainly so many ways in which we can help ensure that the American dream of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness applies to all Americans, it is important that we not forget the good we have done, the progress we have made in this endeavor.

In the many articles I read, my favorites were the 4th of July speeches, particularly those of previous presidents and prominent Americans. In this issue, I will include the speech given by President Ronald Reagan on July 4, 1986, as part of Liberty Weekend – a celebration of the 1984 restoration of the Statue of Liberty.

July 4th Speech, Ronald Reagan, 1986

My fellow Americans:

In a few moments, the celebration will begin here in New York Harbor. It's going to be quite a show. I was just looking over the preparations and thinking about a saying that we had back in Hollywood about never doing a scene with kids or animals because they'd steal the scene every time. So, you can rest assured I wouldn't even think about trying to compete with a fireworks display, especially on the Fourth of July.

My remarks tonight will be brief, but it's worth remembering that all the celebration of this day is rooted in history. It's recorded that shortly after the Declaration of Independence was signed in Philadelphia celebrations took place throughout

the land, and many of the former Colonists -- they were just starting to call themselves Americans -- set off cannons and marched in fife and drum parades.

What a contrast with the sober scene that had taken place a short time earlier in Independence Hall. Fiftysix men came forward to sign the parchment. It was noted at the time that they pledged their lives, their fortunes, and their sacred honors. And that was more than rhetoric: each of those men knew the penalty for high treason to the Crown. "We must all hang together," Benjamin Franklin said, ``or, assuredly, we will all hang separately." And John Hancock, it is said, wrote his signature in large script so King George could see it without his spectacles. They were brave. They stayed brave through all the bloodshed of the coming years. Their courage created a nation built on a universal claim to human dignity, on the proposition that every man, woman, and child had a right to a future of freedom.



July Editorial



Writing the Declaration of Independence in 1776. Jean Leon Gerome Ferris. (1900) Virginia Historical Society. LC-USZC4-9904.

For just a moment, let us listen to the words again: "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness."

Last night when we rededicated Miss Liberty and relit her torch, we reflected on all the millions who came here in search of the dream of freedom inaugurated in Independence Hall.

We reflected, too, on their courage in coming great distances and settling in a foreign land and then passing on to their children and their children's children the hope symbolized in this statue here just behind us: the hope that is America. It is a hope that someday every people and every nation of the world will know the blessings of liberty.

And it's the hope of millions all around the world. In the last few years, I've spoken at Westminster to the mother of Parliaments; at Versailles, where French kings and world leaders have made war and peace. I've been to the Vatican in Rome, the Imperial Palace in Japan, and the ancient city of Beijing. I've seen the beaches of Normandy and stood again with those boys of Pointe du Hoc, who long ago scaled the heights, and with, at that time, Lisa Zanatta Henn, who was at Omaha Beach for the father she loved, the father who had once dreamed of seeing again the place where he and so many brave others had landed on D-day. But he had died before he could make that trip, and she made it for him. ``And, Dad," she had said, ``I'll always be proud.''

And I've seen the successors to these brave men, the young Americans in uniform all over the world, young Americans like you here tonight who man the mighty U.S.S. Kennedy and the lowa and other ships of the line. I can assure you, you out there who are listening, that these young are like their fathers and their grandfathers, just as willing, just as brave. And we can be just as proud. But our prayer tonight is that the call for their courage will never come. And that it's important for us, too, to be brave; not so much the bravery of the battlefield, I mean the bravery of brotherhood.

All through our history, our Presidents and leaders have spoken of national unity and warned us that the real obstacle to moving forward the boundaries of freedom, the only permanent danger to the hope that is America, comes from within. It's easy enough to dismiss this as a kind of familiar exhortation. Yet the truth is that even two of our greatest Founding Fathers, John Adams and Thomas Jefferson, once learned this lesson late in life. They'd worked so closely together in Philadelphia for independence. But once that was gained and a government was formed, something called partisan politics began to get in the way.

After a bitter and divisive campaign, Jefferson defeated Adams for the Presidency in 1800. And the night before Jefferson's inauguration, Adams slipped away to Boston, disappointed, brokenhearted, and bitter.

For years their estrangement lasted. But then when both had retired, Jefferson at 68 to Monticello and Adams at 76 to Quincy, they began through their letters to speak again to each other. Letters that discussed almost every conceivable subject: gardening, horseback riding, even sneezing as a cure for hiccups; but other subjects as well: the loss of loved ones, the mystery of grief and sorrow, the importance of religion, and of course the last thoughts, the final

PERT Emergency Preparedness

The PEERA Board and Haven Management Services have diligently completed the necessary updates to the Palomar Estates East Emergency Preparedness document. It is currently undergoing review and approval by the City of San Marcos.

Our PERT document has been streamlined to align with California Emergency Management Agency, the Governor's Executive Order W-156-97 – Emergency Plans for Mobile Home Parks.



The block captain program has been discontinued, as it was not a sustainable resource. The Emergency Preparedness Committee is a full Board committee so that all PEERA board members are aware of any changes or updates to the Emergency Preparedness document.

The Community Resources committee will continue to provide various emergency preparedness articles for inclusion in *The Breeze*.

It is crucial for each resident to be prepared for any emergency situation. You and your family should develop a safety preparedness plan, gather essential supplies, and engage in advance planning. Whether we face a storm, an earthquake, a wildfire, or a flood, preparedness will enable us to cope better, stay safer, and support one another, regardless of whether we are together or apart.

In the event of an emergency, the main clubhouse will serve as the central hub for local authority information. Residents will be informed of the emergency via robocalls if the phone system is operable.

Community Quilting Group

During the Social Hour on Friday, June 7th, it was brought to our attention that the Quilting Group was facing financial challenges and might need to auction off some of their quilts. In response, Deb Johnston, President of the Social Club, and I (PEERA Chair) engaged in a friendly competition by each pledging a

hopes of two old men, two great patriarchs, for the country that they had helped to found and loved so deeply. "It carries me back," Jefferson wrote about correspondence with his cosigner of the Declaration of Independence, "to the times when, beset with difficulties and dangers, we were fellow laborers in the same cause, strugaling for what is most valuable to man, his right to selfgovernment. Laboring always at the same oar, with some wave ever ahead threatening to overwhelm us and yet passing harmless . . . we rowed through the storm with heart and hand . . . " It was their last gift to us, this lesson in brotherhood, in tolerance for each other, this insight into America's strength as a nation. And when both died on the same day within hours of each other, that date was July 4th, 50 years exactly after that first gift to us, the Declaration of Independence.

My fellow Americans, it falls to us to keep faith with them and all the great Americans of our past. Believe me, if there's one impression I carry with me after the privilege of holding for 5-1/2 years the office held by Adams and Jefferson and Lincoln, it is this: that the things that unite us -- America's past of which we're so proud, our hopes and aspirations for the future of the world and this much-loved country -- these things far outweigh what little divides us.

And so tonight we reaffirm that Jew and gentile, we are one nation under God; that black and white, we are one nation indivisible; that Republican and Democrat, we are all Americans. Tonight, with heart and hand, through whatever trial and travail, we pledge ourselves to each other and to the cause of human freedom, the cause that has given light to this land and hope to the world.

My fellow Americans, we're known around the world as a confident and a happy people.

Tonight there's much to celebrate and many

Tonight there's much to celebrate and many blessings to be grateful for. So while it's good to talk about serious things, it's just as important and just as American to have some fun. Now, let's have some fun -- let the celebration begin.

Liberty Weekend, July 3-6, 1986

Liberty Weekend was a four-day celebration held to celebrate the 1984 restoration and the centenary of the Statue of Liberty (Liberty Enlightening the World) in New York City. It began on July 3, 1986 and ended on July 6.

Much of the interior of the statue had been reconstructed, with a great deal of emphasis placed on enhancing the visitors experience, since the original structure was not

built with the visitor in mind. Renovation efforts were directed to improve the poor lighting conditions, install a ventilation system, and upgrade the very inadequate and basic heating system.

Prior to the restoration, much of the internal structure of the statue was out of sight behind the mesh wire walls of the original helical stairs. The stairs were originally intended for workmen. Neither the architect nor the artist had envisioned that the lady would welcome visitors internally. An article in The New York Times, published less than two months from the centennial celebration, discussed the changes within the statue as being the most spectacular.

The San Marcos Parks and Recreation Department is pleased to announce the long-awaited opening of the City's new bike park on Monday, June 24 at 2 p.m. (This message is from their website.)

Bradley Bike Park, spanning 8 acres, is designed to accommodate a progression of bike skills, making it enjoyable for bikers of all ages and experience levels. The park features three jump lines, ranging from beginner to advanced, and a pump track—a specially designed circuit of rollers, banked turns, and features that riders navigate by "pumping" (generating momentum through body movements) instead of pedaling.

This park was meticulously planned with extensive community input, responding to the expressed need for a bike park in North County.

The project was a true community effort, made possible through Prop. 68 Per Capita grants, County District 5's Neighborhood Reinvestment Program grant, donations from the San Diego Mountain Bike Association, and additional grants secured by the Friends of San Marcos Parks and Recreation.

Protect Your Pets from the Heat!

As we are now in the summer season, it is crucial to address the well-being of our beloved pets during these hot and humid days, often referred to as the "dog days of summer." This phrase has historical roots dating back to the Roman Empire.

It is essential to recognize that pets, like humans, are vulnerable to heat-related illnesses. As responsible pet owners, we must ensure that both ourselves and our animals remain adequately hydrated. Pets rely on us for their care and well-being.

During the hottest hours of the day, it is advisable to minimize outdoor activities with your pets. Hot asphalt or cement can cause severe burns to their paws. To assess the temperature of the ground, simply place the back of your hand on the surface. If it feels too hot for you, it is certainly too hot for your pet's sensitive paws.

Additionally, it is important to be aware of the signs of heat illness in pets. These may include rapid or irregular heart rate, excessive drooling, lethargy, refusal to eat, or excessive panting.

While panting is a normal cooling mechanism for dogs, it can be a concerning sign for cats. If you notice any of these symptoms, promptly remove your pet from the heated environment and place them in a cooler area. Apply cool towels to their body, ensuring to remove and re-wet the towels regularly.



Provide ample amounts of cool, fresh water, but avoid chilling your pet.

Lastly, we want to emphasize the critical importance of never leaving a pet unattended inside a vehicle even for a few minutes. The temperature inside a car can rise rapidly, posing a severe danger to pets, just as it does to humans. Rolling down the windows is not a sufficient safety measure.

By adhering to these guidelines, we can help ensure the safety and well-being of our pets during the "dog days of summer.".

Around Town – San Marcos Restaurant Row Project

Exciting New Amenities for San Marcos...

The new community park planned for the San Marcos Restaurant Row development needs a name, and city officials want residents to chime in with their recommendations.

The new 1.5-acre park is a central feature of the mixed-use project at the historical Restaurant Row site, providing outdoor recreation opportunities alongside 202 housing units and 10,000 square feet of commercial space.

Park designs currently include an "all-wheel flow course" for skateboards, rollerblades, scooters and bikes, four pickleball courts, a playground, a lawn, a stage for public events, a picnic area, and public restrooms.

PUBLIC PARK DESIGN

When completed, the project will include:

- Mixed-Use buildings and more than 10,000 square feet of commercial space for casual dining space, shops and locally-serving services frame the project to encourage a walkable environment where residents can conveniently access and provide ongoing patronage to the businesses onsite as well as along West San Marcos Boulevard. An additional 17,000 square feet is identified for outdoor dining.
- The 1.5-acre public park will anchor the site and provide respite for residents and visitors.
- Landscaped promenades and paseos that not only facilitate pedestrian and bike connectivity, but create public spaces for people to congregate

Summer Up!

July often marks the beginning of the warm summer months. It is crucial to ensure that your home is equipped to efficiently manage energy consumption while maintaining a comfortable indoor environment. This not only contributes to your well-being but also prevents the accumulation of mold and moisture, safeguarding the structural integrity of your property. Here are some basic reminders:

Bathroom Maintenance

- ✓ Eliminate visible signs of mold by repairing and cleaning grout, replacing caulk, and sealing necessary areas.
- ✓ Clean faucet aerators and showerheads.
- ✓ Wash windows and door screens.
- ✓ Verify that drainage systems are functioning properly to ensure water flows away from the foundation.

HVAC and Furnace Filters

✓ Regularly maintain HVAC and furnace filters. Change filters every 3 months on average, or more frequently if you have pets, use a fireplace, or have allergen sensitivities.

Clean the Drver

✓ Clean out all the dust and lint trapped in the vent and exhaust duct. Dryers can be a fire hazard if they're not cleaned and maintained regularly.

Ceiling Fans

- ✓ Ensure ceiling fan blades are spinning. counterclockwise in warm weather to create a downdraft and cool the air.
- ✓ Switch blades back to clockwise in colder weather to create an updraft and circulate warm air.
- ✓ Balance wobbly blades by tightening loose screws and dusting them if needed.

Refrigerator Coils

✓ Clean the coils under the refrigerator to extend its life and improve its energy efficiency.

Pest Control

- ✓ Check plants, shrubs, and trees for signs of insect infestation.
- ✓ Look for signs of termites, such as flaking. wood or mud buildup and tunneling systems.



What You Don't Know About Hearing Aids

A TEDx Talks video on Mar 2, 2024 by Juliëtte Sterkens

Juliëtte Sterkens, a seasoned audiologist with over four decades of experience, delivered a compelling TEDx talk "What You Don't Know About Hearing Aids," shedding light on the common misconceptions and limitations associated with hearing aid technology.

Introduction

I'd like to start with a short demonstration. Now, I'd like you to take your two fingers and put them lightly against the pointy bits in front of your ears. Now, I'd like you to push until your ears are completely plugged and keep them plugged. And what you're experiencing right now is mild hearing loss.

Okay, you can let go. What you experienced just now is mild temporary hearing loss. In my audiology practice, I routinely tested new patients with hearing loss twice as bad as you just experienced.

Hearing loss is common. For many of us, it's not a matter of if, but when we will lose some of our hearing. About half of us will acquire it by age 75, two-thirds of us when we reach our mid-80s. It's on the increase in children, and baby boomers are experiencing more hearing loss than those of past generations. And if hearing loss runs in the family, there's a good chance you'll get it too.

The Impact of Hearing Loss

You've got to choose your parents wisely. But kidding aside, besides affecting quality of life, it can have serious repercussions such as depression,

social isolation, contribute to cognitive decline, and even increase the risk of falls in older adults. And hearing loss is much more than a loss of volume, the kind of hearing loss that you just experienced. Pitches are heard unequally.

My father could stand right under a smoke alarm, not hear a thing, but he had no trouble hearing the garbage truck rumble down the street from inside the house. And hearing loss due to aging and noise exposure changes how we understand speech. And it causes words that sound similar, like zip and sip, wake and late, mad and dead and bad, to sound the same, especially when there's background noise. And as unintuitive as it may be, loud sounds can become unbearably loud, distortingly loud.

The Limitations of Hearing Aids

Hearing loss is a complex problem. Perhaps you know people who, even wearing hearing aids, still have to have the TV volume up, always watch TV with subtitles, frequently ask everybody to repeat that. "Would you please repeat that?" Aren't hearing aids supposed to solve these problems?

When I began helping people with hearing loss over 44 years ago, I expected that hearing aids would be like eyeglasses, and that wearing them would make everything sound crystal clear. If that were only true. I have personally witnessed over four decades of hearing aid developments, advancements, from analog to digital devices, devices that can be remotely programmed, that include fitness tracking and feedback and noise reduction using artificial intelligence. They still don't work the way we hope they would. And how can they?

Advancements and Challenges

Hearing aids can't make hearing normal. They're good at making sound louder. But they can't always make sound, the speech, clearer, especially when the inner ear and the hearing nerve are affected. And hearing aid microphones have a limited effective range of about four or five arm's length.

And hearing the world through these tiny hearing aid microphones reduces our exquisite three-dimensional hearing ability down to one dimension. Consequently, hearing aids cannot improve the clarity of the sounds we want to hear relative to the sounds we don't want to hear beyond that critical microphone distance. Something that normal hearing ears accomplish effortlessly. Of course, hearing aids are needed to make sound audible.

Enhancing Hearing Experience

But for many, they are not a complete solution, especially when you consider that hearing aids, at best, even the most advanced hearing aids, can only restore about half of the hearing loss sensitivity.

Well, what about the other half? What about those microphone distance limitations? Better hearing is possible. And let's talk about some tools and some strategies that can make that happen. We're all familiar with these little wireless earbuds that allow people to listen to music and make phone calls whenever they're on the go.

Did you know many modern hearing aids can do that also? Hearing aids can be paired via
Bluetooth technology and an app on the smartphone to make hands-free phone calling possible, as well as the streaming of podcasts and audio books and those Google maps navigation directions right into hearing aids.

ADA Law

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) requires that places of public accommodation (e.g., high school auditoriums, courtrooms, and theaters) where a public address system is in use, also provide an assistive listening systems.

The Role of Telecoils in Hearing Aids

As an audiologist, an advocate with the Hearing Loss Association of America, I work to help consumers hear their best with their existing hearing aids and especially help them hear in public venues using these assistive listening systems. That's made easier if their hearing aid includes what is called a <u>telecoil</u>. It's a tiny antenna that comes to the consumer at little or no cost, and when that telecoil is turned on, generally it requires a push of a button, it will receive signals that are broadcast by a hearing loop system. Hearing loop is one type of assistive listening system.

Frequently, that little telecoil is already in the hearing aid, but the consumer is unaware because their audiologist may not have activated that feature in the computer and not explained what that little telecoil is for, or worse, there's no telecoil in the hearing aid because it wasn't recommended at the time of purchase.

If a person has a telecoil in their hearing aid and a venue has a hearing loop installed, all that consumer needs to do is walk in, sit down, and when the lecture or the show starts, turn on the telecoil.

We've made some terrific progress, from about two dozen hearing loops in 2011, to nearly 900 hearing loops today. These hearing loops are in senior centers, and in library meeting rooms, in high school auditoriums, in courtrooms, in city halls, and in some 500 places of worship. Hearing loops are indicated by a blue symbol with the letter T (stands for 'telecoil').




